

Sermon Questions: The Lost Sheep

Date: September 26, 2021 | Scripture: Matthew 18:10-14

- 1. Who are the 'little ones' in the passage? Why might the disciples despise them?
- 2. As well as referring to his 'little ones,' Jesus uses the word 'one' four times in these few verses. What point might he be making?
- 3. Lost sheep are isolated and vulnerable. When we find ourselves lost, we are also often regretful and ashamed. How does Jesus describe the reaction of the shepherd finding the sheep in the story? What does that tell us about God?
- 4. Verse 14 teaches us that it is not God's will that any of these little ones should perish. Many believe that God delights in catching people out and punishing people. Have you believed Jesus' words here? Or have lies about His character shaped your understanding of God?
- 5. 'The lostness of mankind is due to our forsaking the voice of our shepherd.' How can we seek the voice of the shepherd this week?
