

Sermon Questions

Date: *February 19, 2023* | Scripture: <u>Mark 11:27-</u> <u>12:12</u>

- 1. Read the passage from the sermon together. What do you find convicting? What do you find challenging? What do you find confusing?
- 2. How would you describe the relationship between Jesus and the religious authorities of his day?
- 3. The religious leaders of this passage abused their power. Where have you seen power abused?
- 4. How do we fall into the same error of the chief priests and scribes and elders in trying to assert our own authority against God? What parts of our life do we claim God has no say over?
- 5. How does Jesus confront the chief priests, scribes, and elders in their abuse of power?

Inward Grace in Action

In Isaiah 5, God tells a story of his vineyard which he ultimately destroys as it fails to produce good fruit. Isaiah explains this as a symbol: God will judge Israel's unfaithfulness and wickedness by destroying the kingdom and sending his people into exile.

Jesus borrows from this story and expands on it in his response to the chief priests, scribes, and elders. In it, he rebukes them for following in the footsteps of their ancestors who dismissed and killed the prophets. They had laid claim to God's vineyard and seized its fruit for themselves. Their rebellion will climax with their killing of the owner's own son. Yet, Jesus finishes his parable with a reference to Psalm 118. Rather than a psalm of destruction, Psalm 118 is a song of celebration and deliverance.

- Read both Isaiah 5:1-17 and Psalm 118. How do these two passages relate to each other?
- How do both of these passages find their fulfillment in the person and work of Christ?
