

Sermon Questions

Date: May 7, 2023 | Scripture: Psalm 95 (Grace-filled worship)

- 1. Read the passage from the sermon together. What do you find convicting? What do you find challenging? What do you find confusing?
- 2. Read Exodus 17:1-7, the passage this psalm references. How is Israel's "trial" of God related to their failure to worship?
- 3. What experiences in your life have become barriers to worship? When have you been in a place where you were tempted to accuse God rather than worship him?
- 4. How does Jesus model worshipping God in the face of difficulties?
- 5. What is the relationship between worship and rest? Read Hebrews 3:7-4:13 and look for the way these two things are connected.
- 6. What is the relationship between worship and rest?

Inward Grace in Action

We specifically aim toward "grace-filled" worship. Think about what that means. It is easy for worship to become rote, whether at church or at home. Worship can also produce a sense of guilt if one thinks they're not doing it right or not "feeling it" enough. Grace-filled worship does not lead to shame or to boredom. Instead, it comes from a place of profound love and gratitude and leads to, among many things, rest.

- What does it look like for personal or family worship to be grace-filled?
- What does it look like for corporate church worship to be grace-filled?
