

## Sermon Questions

## Date: July 30, 2023 | Scripture: <u>Psalm 29</u>

- Read the passage from the sermon together. What do you find convicting? What do you find challenging? What do you find confusing?
- 2. When do you find yourself praying the most? When things are going well? When things are hard? Are you consistent or erratic?

This psalm portrays God's voice as thunder and describes his presence as a powerful thunderstorm. To ancient Israel, thunderstorms brought rainfall, which was essential to life. Therefore, this psalm is praising God for his provision and celebrating him in good times. David is tracing the line back to God as the giver of life and prosperity.

- 3. How have you seen God provide for your needs? A new job? A place to live? Community? A spouse? Children? Share a story of one way God has provided for you.
- 4. What does it look like for you to give God praise for the good things he's given you?

Songs which were almost identical to this one were sung by pagan Canaanites to their rain god Baal. Israelites would have been tempted to ask their Canaanite neighbors "How do you get your gardens to grow?" They would have responded, "Oh, that's easy! You pray to Baal, you sacrifice some animals. If it's really bad, you cut yourself and offer a child. And then it rains!" David intentionally writes this song in the same style as Baal praises to recognize that the God of Israel is the true God who controls the rain and brings life. Just like the Israelites, we're also tempted to ask our neighbors "How can I make my garden grow?"
