# APPALACHIAN CULTURE

#### **OVERVIEW**

The federal government defines Appalachia as parts of West Virginia, New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, Ohio, Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, and Mississippi. It incorporates 397 counties in 13 states, covers a total of 195,000 square miles, and has a current population of over 20 million. The word Appalachia is an old Indian word meaning "endless mountain range." The Native Americans thought the Appalachian Mountains went on forever and ever and ever. The mountains kept Appalachia isolated from the rest of the country and other people's involvement in their lives. Therefore, the people in this region developed their own distinctive culture. A land of steep wooded hills, narrow valleys, and winding streams is one of immense beauty, but also of contradictory tragedy.

To fully understand Appalachia, it is important to recognize this diversity. Made up of many unique backgrounds - Native Americans, Irish, English and Scotch, and then a third immigration of Germans and Poles - all blended across the region. Today, Appalachian people are more diverse than ever, both rural and urban. Nevertheless, they share a common pride, common values, and a common heritage. Appalachians may be described as independent, contented with the places where they live, close to nature, and displaying a deep sense of being kind and helping one another. With that said, as the mountains have seperated them from outside cultures for so long, they also display a deep mistrust of anyone new making them resistant to change.

Appalachian culture has been preserved mostly by families and churches. With that being said, while religion is important in Appalachia, the reality is that better than 65% of the region is unchurched. Some counties are as high as 80% unchurched. Culture and religion are interwoven, and while mountain people believe the Bible, respect the church, and welcome anyone who comes in the name of the Lord, the organized aspects of religion have not been important factors to the people of Appalachia.

The people in this region have suffered from industries such as oil, coal, mining, timber, and others. Having extracted the

resources from this region and enjoyed many years of prosperity, a lot of these industries have left, leaving the landscape scarred yet beautiful, exploited yet underdeveloped. Even after all this, you will still find a people that are proud of strong family values, self-reliance, and pride.

#### **DEMOGRAPHICS OF FAIRMONT**

<u>City:</u> Fairmont is located at the junction of the Tygart and West Fork rivers, which form the Monongahela, one of the few northward-flowing rivers in the world. It was established in 1820, then called Middletown, and was first called Fairmont (Fair Mountain) in 1842 by the Virginia Assembly.

<u>Population:</u> The population of West Virginia is approximately 1,855,684 (2011). Fairmont has just under 20,000 residents. Many of these are older, poorer people, of various ethnic backgrounds.

<u>Topography:</u> Fairmont is in a valley, mostly level. It covers 311 square miles and its average elevation is 911 feet.

<u>Climate:</u> Usually the climate for Fairmont, because of the elevation, is cold in the winters, with average temperatures of 30F, with a high chance of snow. Summers are usually hot during the day, but cool at night, with average temperatures of 65 - 70F.

Time Zone: Eastern Standard Time.

# **POLICIES**

The following policies are for your family's safety and peace of mind during our trip. While not all of the policies are to be followed outside of the trip, due to the unique nature of serving in cross-cultural ministry, all participants must adhere to the following policies while they serve in this context:

- 1. All safety guidelines in accordance with Dayspring policy will be followed. Continued violation will lead to the prohibition of work-site privileges for the remainder of the trip.
  - a. This includes the wearing of adequate safety equipment and dress on the job site.
  - b. Cell phone use is allowed, but encouraged to be used wisely on the job site. All members of the team must be aware of their surroundings in a construction zone.
- 2. The use or purchase of alcohol and tobacco is prohibited at all times. Participants who use or purchase alcohol or tobacco will be sent home at their own expense.
- 3. All guidelines in accordance with Dayspring's Youth/Adult policy will be followed.
  - a. The ordinary and customary procedure for the supervision of youth on all IMPACT WV projects will be the "two adults" rule. The "two adults" rule states that a minimum of two adults should be involved in the supervision of youth at any given point on a project.
  - b. Further guidelines will be discussed in detail at the team meeting.

# Lodging:

Impact WV teams stay at Dayspring Camp and Conference Center (Dayspring), which has bunk beds in open bay cabins along with some divided cabins for small families and groups. The camp can hold approximately 175 participants per week. Teams will need to bring towels and bed linens/pillows. Breakfast and dinner are served at the camp; sack lunches and water or lemonade are supplied for the work site.
