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Check your own stats:

iPhone: Settings > Screen Time

View Screen Time reports

After you turn on App & Website Activity, you can view a report of your device use. The report includes how much time you or your child spend using certain kinds of apps, how often you pick up your iPhone and other devices, what apps send you the most notifications, and more.

1. Open the Settings app, then tap Screen Time.
2. To see your Screen Time report, tap See All App & Website Activity. To see your child's Screen Time report, scroll down, tap their name, then tap See All App & Website Activity.
 - Tap Devices to select which device that you want to view.
 - Tap Week to view a summary of weekly use or tap Day to see a summary of daily use.
 - Under Most Used, select an app or website to find more details or add or edit limits.

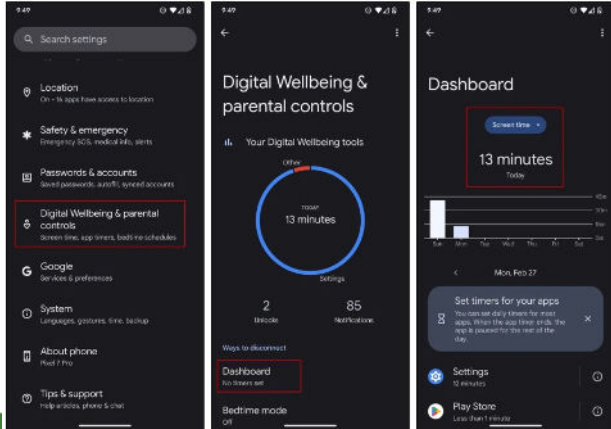
If you have Share Across Devices turned on, you can view overall usage across all of the devices that are signed in with your Apple ID.



Android: Settings > Digital Wellbeing & parental controls > Dashboard

How to check screen time on Android:

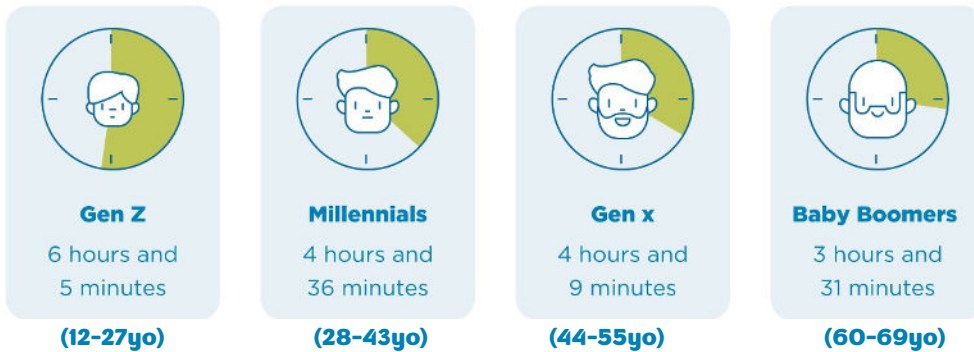
1. Open the Settings app.
2. Select Digital Wellbeing & parental controls.
3. Hit Dashboard.
4. Check the time under Screen time.

Daily Phone Screen Time by Generation



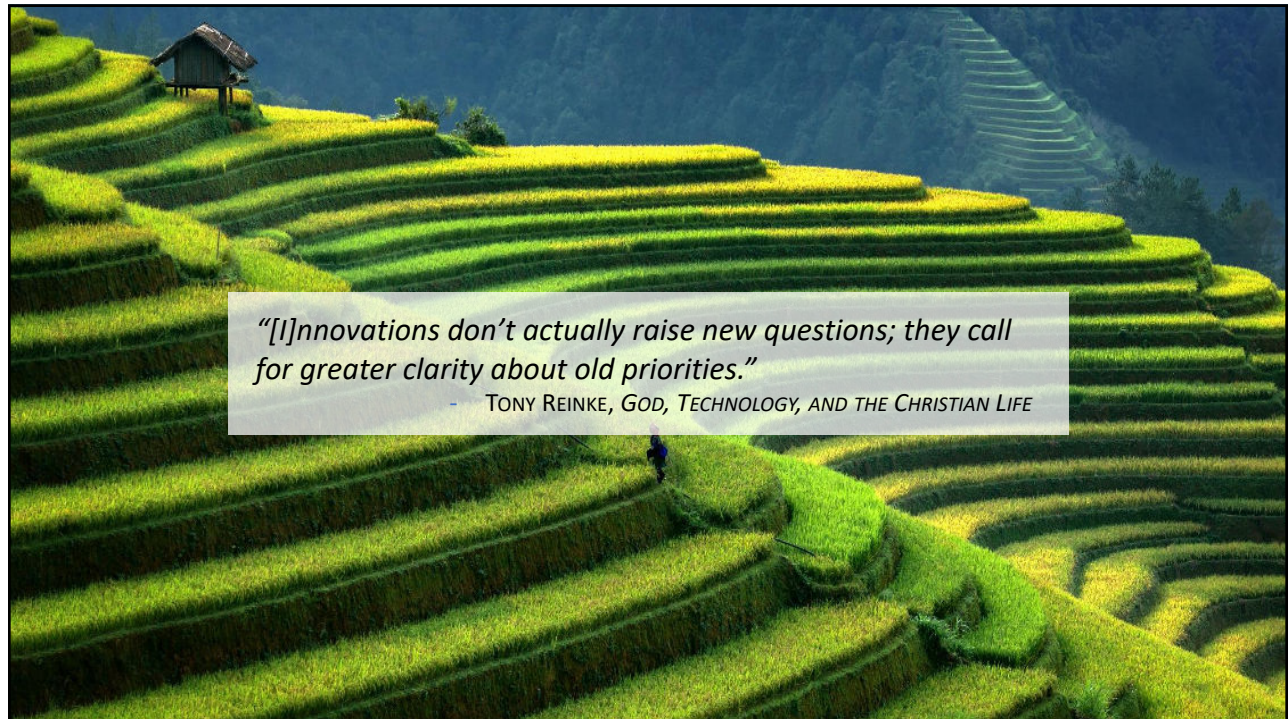
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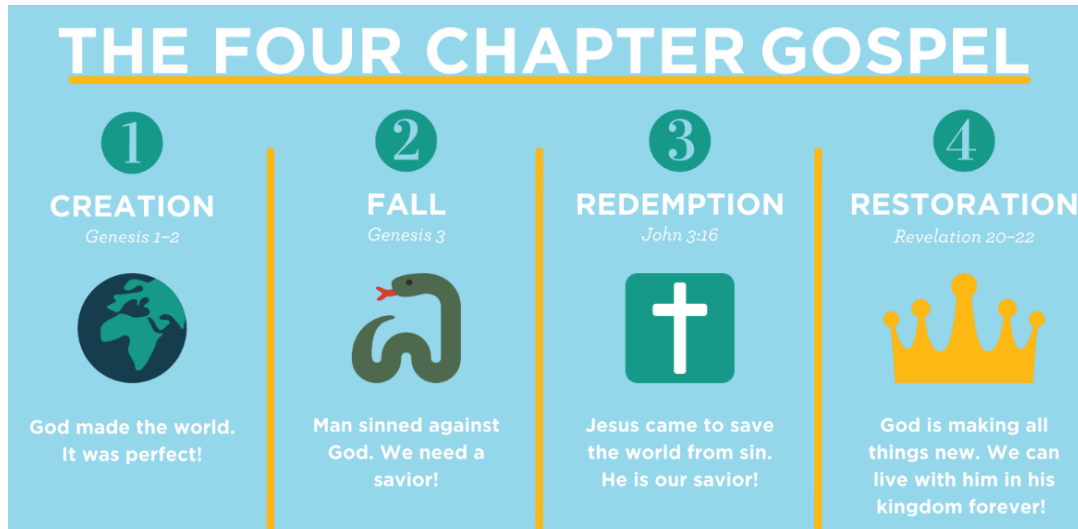

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Creation



“In the beginning, **God created the heavens and the earth...**[T]he Lord **God formed the man of dust from the ground** and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living creature.”

GENESIS 1:1, 2:7

“So **God created man in his own image**, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.”

GENESIS 1:27

1. God is the Creator, and we are the created beings.
2. We are embodied creatures. God created us with physical bodies, not just souls and minds.
3. We have intrinsic worth and dignity from God.

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Creation



“Dill is not threshed with a threshing sledge, nor is a cart wheel rolled over cumin, but dill is beaten out with a stick, and cumin with a rod.

Does one crush grain for bread? No, he does not thresh it forever; when he drives his cart wheel over it with his horses, he does not crush it.

4. *God is the One who gives us the knowledge, creativity, and skills to cultivate the land (Gen. 1:28) through tools and technology.*

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Fall

MARK 7:21-23

→ *In practice, the design and use of technology is never neutral because humans always design and use them for good, evil, or some combination of both.*

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Redemption



“But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, **made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved**—and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the coming ages he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus.”

- *Christ’s death and resurrection enables those who follow Him to seek good and bring good out of our most dangerous inventions (“special grace”).*

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Restoration



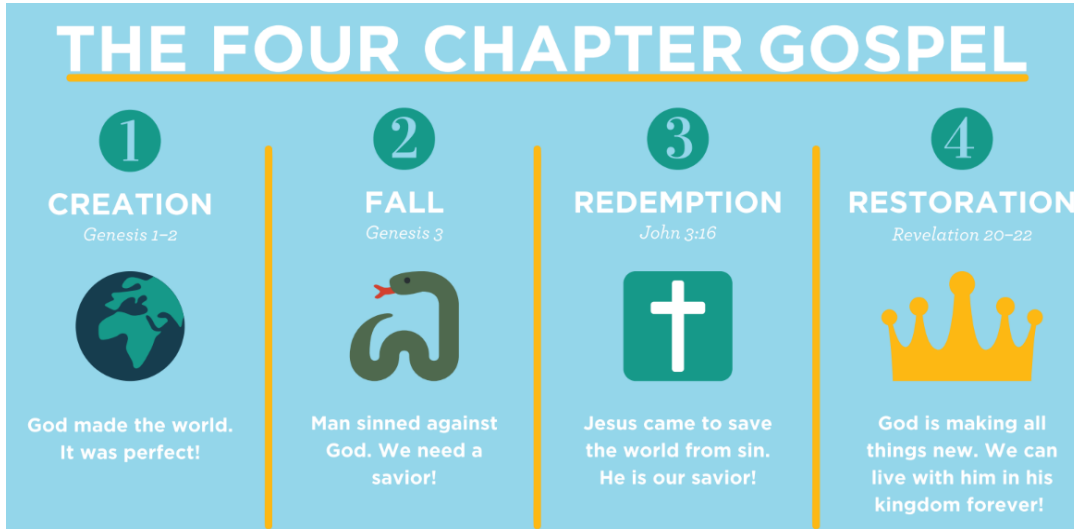

1. *As citizens of heaven, not earth, be ready to be a nonconformist! (Romans 12:2, Philippians 2:20-21).*
2. *Our tech struggles have an end point: God is doing a good work in us, to present us holy and blameless before Him (Colossians 1:22, Philippians 1:6). He will restore all things, including all that we look to technology to satisfy and fulfill.*

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Goals for Tech-Wise Living

1. What is the way to true flourishing?

“Blessed is the man

[...whose] **delight is in the law of the Lord,**
and on his law he meditates day and night.

He is like a tree

planted by streams of water
that yields its fruit in its season,
and its leaf does not wither.”

PSALM 1:1,2-3

→ *Living according to God’s ways by following God’s commands is the way to true human flourishing.*

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Goals for Tech-Wise Living

1. What is the way to true flourishing?

“As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father’s commandments and abide in his love. **These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full.**”

JOHN 15:9-11

“The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. **I came that they may have life and have it abundantly.**”

JOHN 10:10

→ *God’s commands are not only right, but good and joy-giving for us!*

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Goals for Tech-Wise Living

2. Why do we live according to God's ways?

"To this end we always pray for you, that our God may make you worthy of his calling and may fulfill every resolve for good and every work of faith by his power, **so that the name of our Lord Jesus may be glorified in you, and you in him**, according to the grace of our God and the Lord Jesus Christ."

2 THESSALONIANS 1:11-12

"So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, **do all to the glory of God.**"

1 CORINTHIANS 10:31

→ *The ultimate goal of living according to God's ways is to glorify Him.*

*"God's glory is the end of creation and the aim of all our innovations."

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Goals for Tech-Wise Living

3. How do we live according to God's ways?

"You shall **love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind**. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall **love your neighbor as yourself**. On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets."

MATTHEW 22:37-40

"**God is able to make all grace abound to you**, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, **you may abound in every good work.**"

2 CORINTHIANS 9:8

1. *God's commands are to love Him wholly and to love our neighbor as ourselves.*
2. *Grace is not just pardon, but power to live: By His grace, God not only commands, but equips His followers with power to obey His commands.*

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Goals for Tech-Wise Living

4. Practical application: So what?

- We don't need to vilify or completely throw out technology.
- At the same time, we should be aware of ***how tech is designed to be used*** and ***how we use technology***
- We should aim to design and use tech ***to love God and neighbor, for the glory of God***

Questions to ask ourselves:

- ***How, why, and when do I use technology? How is technology shaping me?***
- ***Does my use of technology bring GLORY to God? Does it honor Him? Does it LOVE GOD and LOVE OUR NEIGHBOR as ourselves?***

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Goals for Tech-Wise Living

4. Practical application: What heart issues are at play when we engage with technology?

- Example: **Social Comparison**
 - 1. What is actually going on?***
 - I compare others' best-filtered, exterior life online with my worst-version, interior self
 - 2. What can this lead to?***
 - Envy, coveting, discontentment, self-absorption
 - 3. What biblical truths speak to this?***
 - I have SO much to be thankful for in Christ (Colossians 1).
 - God is up to good in my areas of lack, and worthy of my trust (Romans 8:31-39).
 - I take the focus off of myself by loving and serving others (John 13:34).
→ ***leads to loving God (cultivating gratitude to Him) and loving neighbor (rejoicing in another's' joys, rather than being envious of them; serving others rather than self-absorption)***

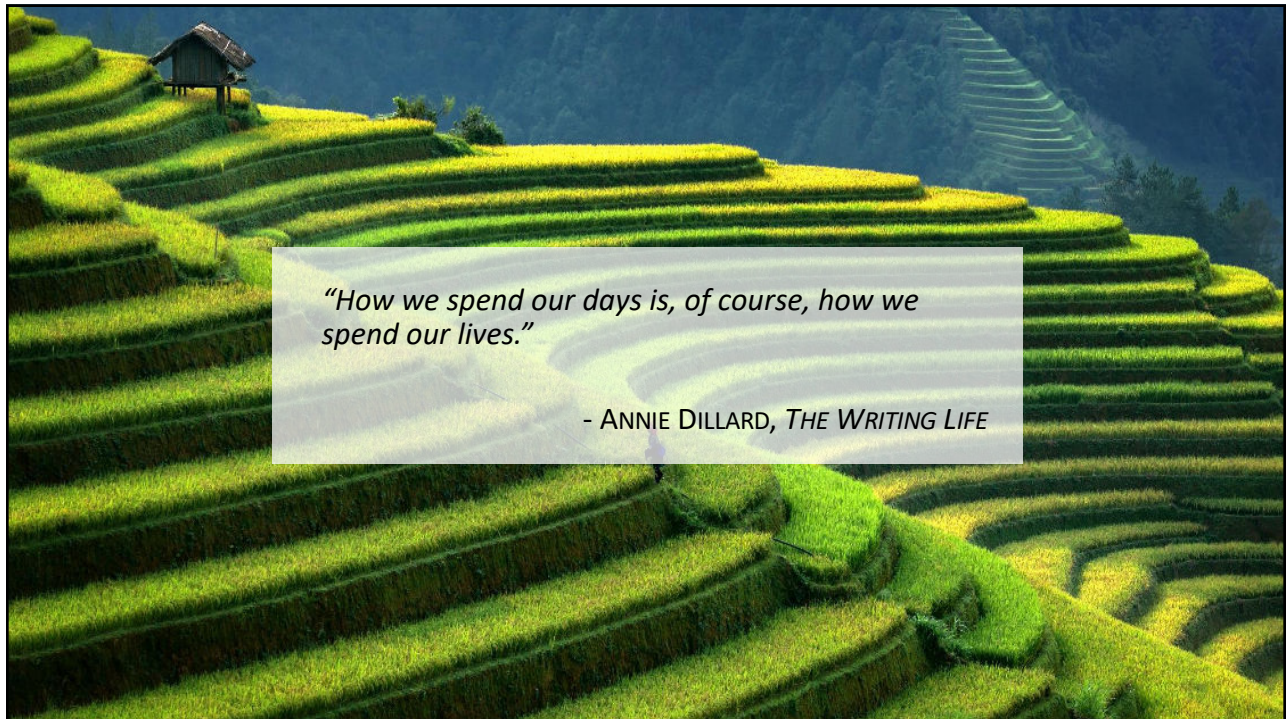

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Practical Application: Rhythms, Space, & Structure

1. Rhythms and Routines

- Technology allows us to be distracted by “easy everywhere” and “always on.”
- Instead, consider the rhythms of your day:
 - *What do you reach for first thing in the morning?*
 - *What do you go to bed doing?*
 - “Tech fasts”: 1 hour per day, 1 day per week, 1 week per year
- *How can I build healthy, regular patterns of work and rest into my life?*
 - What is truly **restorative rest** (cf. Sabbath rest, Exodus 20:8-11)—not just meaningless distraction?
 - Do I give myself times of tech-free **silence, stillness, or contemplation**?

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Practical Application: Rhythms, Space, & Structure

2. Physical Space

- Consider the physical spaces where you live.
 - *Where are your most formative spaces?* (E.g. work, school, home)
 - *What is the role of technology in them?*
- We are embodied creatures meant to live in physical space!
 - *Where can we connect with one another and our outside world without the distraction of digital devices?*
 - Suggested “tech-free zones”:
 - At the dinner table
 - In the car (“Car time is conversation time”)
 - In the bedroom (especially for children)

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Practical Application: Rhythms, Space, & Structure

3. Structure

- **Modeling positive consumption of media/use of technology**
 - *Am I meaningfully engaging with technology?* (creating v. consuming)
 - *Am I discerning in my consumption of online content?* (media literacy)
 - *Am I loving my neighbor through my online conduct?* (digital citizenship)
- **Seeking healthy access and accountability**
 - *Do I need to set up barriers to accessing technology?* (e.g. content controls, screen time limits)
 - *Do I have a safe space to talk about temptations, struggles, and sin with technology?*
 - *Do I have a healthy culture of confession/accountability in my home?*

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Practical Application: Linking Arms

“To resist the digital liturgies, we need regular immersion into the embodied community of God.” – Samuel James

- Asking together:
 - *How can we prioritize “heart-soul-mind-strength activities” with each other as a church body?*
 - *How can we build in-person relationships?*
 - *How can we provide accountability and help one another digitally flourish?*



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Final Thoughts

1. A word of comfort
 - **There is no *technology*, no *wielder of technology*, and no *outcome of technology* outside of God's control, or His sovereign will (Isaiah 54:16-17).**
2. A word of hope
 - **Jesus is our wisdom, righteousness, sanctification, and redemption (1 Cor. 1:25, 30)!**
